

Roots of Empathy Program

The grade 1/2 students in Mrs. Haine's (Liddiard's) class have been participating in the Roots of Empathy program this year. This program teaches children about feelings, their own feelings, and the feelings of others. Once every three weeks, baby Eddy and his mother visit the classroom. The children watch and discuss how baby Eddy grows and changes each time he visits. They have opportunities to note his developmental milestones during his first year. Each week the children ask "When is baby Eddy visiting again?" They look forward to his visits and have begun to feel an attachment to the baby.

The ROE Instructor also coaches the children in observing the baby and reading the cues the baby gives as to how the baby is feeling: "Is the baby happy or sad?" "How can you tell?" And we use this discussion as a lever for the children to talk about their own emotions and to understand how their classmates feel: "How can you tell if your friend is sad?" "What can you do to help a friend that is sad?" Being able to understand how other people are feeling is called empathy.

For more than ten years across Canada and internationally, thousands of children are learning respect and care for one another with the lessons started through their Roots of Empathy baby. Hastings School is fortunate to have this program offered at our school.

The lessons will be wrapping up in May and we are now searching for a new ROE baby for the next school year. If you know of anyone who lives in the community, is expecting a baby in June, July or August and may be interested in having their baby participate in this valuable program for only 9 visits throughout the school year, please have them contact Hastings school.

February was a great month!


