

Academic Rigor


- A commitment to deep understanding in content areas

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Will this program prepare my child for University?

Yes. We follow provincial curriculums to ensure that students have the necessary
knowledge and skills necessary for University. Additionally, the intention of the
program is to prepare students to be independent learners. This is the nature of
University learning. Students in University need to be able to manage their time,
set priorities, find their own sources, and ask good questions to be successful.
These are skills we practice explicitly, with increasing complexity through the grades.

Do students still get electives?

• **Yes**. Students in Grade 9 and 10 will have 4 choices for electives. Grade 11 and 12 students also have a variety of elective choices (same as other high schools).

Does the program change after grade 9?

• Grade 10 is similar to grade 9 in structure. In Grade 11 and 12, courses will be semestered to allow students opportunities to attend LRATC, Propel, and other options. Additionally, each year we embed different levels of preparation for independence.

Do you run extracurricular programs?

• **Yes**. We have many opportunities for students to participate in sports, music, leadership and special interest clubs.


