


LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT



APPLIED BUSINESS MANAGEMENT

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Designed for students with an interest in business, economics and entrepreneurship. Students will receive theoretical and practical experiences through project-based learning. The program provides a foundation and a head start for students considering further post-secondary education in business at a college or university.

INTERNSHIP

A 3 week internship will take place in both part 1 and part 2 of the program, providing an opportunity to experience 2 different business opportunities.

CERTIFICATION

LRATC will award certificates to students who successfully complete the requirements for this eight-credit program.

Dual Credit Courses - Upon successful completion of the program, in addition to the eight high school credits, students will earn up to six credit hours at the University of Winnipeg. The dual credit courses are Introduction to Business (BUS-1201(3)) and Introduction to Business 2 (BUS1202(3)).

AUTOMOTIVE TECHNOLOGY

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Designed for students with an interest in auto mechanics. The program consists of classroom theory, lab practice and shop work to prepare students for employment, apprenticeship or further education in the automotive industry. This program teaches the fundamentals of the current drive train management systems and the automotive electronics course is designed to deliver the latest automotive technology. Students repair actual vehicle faults using advanced diagnostic equipment.

INTERNSHIP

A four-week internship is a component in PART 2 of the program.

CERTIFICATION

LRATC will award certificates to students who successfully complete the requirements for this eight-credit program.

APPRENTICESHIP OPPORTUNITIES

The Automotive Technology program at LRATC is accredited by Apprenticeship Manitoba under the trade of Automotive Service Technician. To receive credit for Level 1 in-school Technical Training and a time credit of 900 hours, students must:

- Successfully complete the Automotive Technology program at LRATC.
- Maintain a minimum 70% average in both theory and practical.
- Gain employment and register as an apprentice within two years of graduating from the program.

BAKING & PASTRY ARTS

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

For students with a strong personal interest in pastry and specialty baking. Comprised of both theory and practical training, the program offers instruction in bakeshop management, specialized tools and equipment, control of the baking process, chemical leavening agents, planning and preparation of numerous types of pastries, breads, specialty desserts and cakes. Students will also study topics such as hygiene, sanitation, as well as, preparation, storage, and handling of supplies and ingredients.

INTERNSHIP

A two week internship in both PART 1 and PART 2 is a component of this program.

CERTIFICATION

LRATC will award certificates to students who successfully complete the requirements for this eight-credit program.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Broadcast Media consists of the production and transmission of audio or video programming for a variety of media, including radio, television, and the internet.

A focus on developing the knowledge, skills and attitudes required to produce and transmit videos, short films, documentaries, newscasts, news stories and commercials.

INTERNSHIP

Students will gain hands-on experience while participating in an internship with the school's online TV station – LRSD TV. Students will be required to participate in various evening and weekend events in the community. This program also provides a three week off-site internship in PART 2.

CERTIFICATION

LRATC will award certificates to students who successfully complete the requirements for this eight-credit program.

BUILDING TRADES

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Do you like working with your hands? A Cooperative Vocational Education (CVE) program, students (minimum 16 years old) spend one day per week in a classroom learning essential construction theory and four days per week receiving hands-on instruction with a contractor. Students may experience building construction trades in carpentry, concrete, flooring, renovating, heating/HVAC, plumbing, painting, cabinet-making and other areas that will prepare them for employment, apprenticeship or further education.

INTERNSHIP

Each semester students will complete 375 hours of on the job training with a contractor. Students will have a wide variety of work options to choose from, dependent upon the availability of construction sites.

CERTIFICATION

LRATC will award certificates to students who successfully complete the requirements for this eight-credit program. Students must complete 375 hours of work practicum and 125 theory hours in both PART 1 and PART 2 to receive certification credit.

CULINARY ARTS

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

This eight-credit program is designed for students with a strong personal interest in Culinary Arts. It includes a blend of practical, theory, entrepreneurship, catering and daily on-the-job training. It develops cooking skills and introduces students to business management techniques. The Culinary Arts program offers instruction in the purchase, preparation, costing and serving of food. Students will study topics such as food safety, knife skills, kitchen organization, production and time management.

INTERNSHIP

A five-week internship is a component in PART 2 of the program.

CERTIFICATION

LRATC will award certificates to students who successfully complete the requirements for this eight-credit program.

APPRENTICESHIP OPPORTUNITIES

The Culinary Arts program at LRATC is accredited by Apprenticeship Manitoba under the trade of Cook. To receive credit for Level 1 in-school Technical Training and a time credit of 900 hours student must:

- Successfully complete the Culinary Arts program at LRATC.
- Maintain an accumulative average of 70% or better in the trade course material.
- Gain employment and register as an apprentice within two years of graduating.

Designed for students with an interest in early childhood education and to prepare students for employment in child care centres. The program provides a strong foundation and a head start for students considering further post-secondary education leading to the Early Childhood Educator II (ECE II) designation.

INTERNSHIP

On Thursdays and Fridays students will gain hands on experience while participating in a mandatory work internship in an early learning centre (days of the week subject to change).

CERTIFICATION

LRATC will award certificates to students who successfully complete the requirements for this ten-credit program.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Electrical Trades prepares students for an Apprenticeship by providing a strong foundation in residential and commercial wiring and a variety of electrical installations. Upon completion, students will be prepared to seek employment as a Level 1 Electrical apprentice or continue further post-secondary education in a related field.

PRACTICUM

All practical work is performed in the on-site lab facility. Therefore, students do not participate in an off-site internship.

CERTIFICATION

LRATC will award certificates to students who successfully complete the requirements for this eight-credit program.

APPRENTICESHIP OPPORTUNITIES

The Electrical Trades program at LRATC is accredited by Apprenticeship Manitoba for the trades of; Construction Electrician, Industrial Electrician, and Power Electrician. To receive credit for Level 1 in-school Technical Training and a time credit of 900 hours students must:

- Successfully complete the Electrical Trades program at LRATC (900 hours).
- Maintain an accumulative average of 70% or better in the trade subjects.
- Gain employment and register as an apprentice within 2 years of graduating.

- Tuition: NO COST (high school students) | \$5,500 full program | \$2,750 per semester
- Student Fee: \$25 per semester



Students will experience a high energy, fun, and creative environment.

Learn to add individuality when performing real spa services using leading esthetics equipment. Students will learn about and work with professional nail, skin and body products. Esthetics is based on Apprenticeship Manitoba and Manitoba Education and Training curriculum.

PRACTICUM

Students will have the opportunity to work with clients over the course of their program in the school's salon and will not be required to work off-site.

CERTIFICATION

LRATC will award certificates to students who successfully complete the requirements for this eleven-credit program. Esthetics is a designated trade under Apprenticeship Manitoba, therefore in order to work in the industry students must meet Apprenticeship standards (see below).

APPRENTICESHIP OPPORTUNITIES

The Esthetics program at LRATC is accredited by Apprenticeship Manitoba under the trade of Esthetician. To become an apprentice in this trade, students must:

- Successfully complete the Esthetics program at LRATC (1210 hours).
- Maintain an accumulative average of 70% or better in the trade subjects.
- Obtain a grade of 70% or higher on each component of the in-school practical exam administered by Apprenticeship Manitoba.
- Have a completed Grade 12 high school standing or equivalent.
- Gain employment under the supervision of a Journeyperson
 Esthetician and to register as an apprentice, within two years.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Hairstyling program is a 12-credit, 3 semester Apprenticeship-accredited program which educates and develops skilled hairstylists in a state of the art facility using current techniques, tools and equipment. LRATC provides students with many industry opportunities, including practical experience in the LRATC Salon, industry guest speakers, photo shoots, competitions and more!

INTERNSHIP

Students will have the opportunity to work with clients over the course in the school's salon. Students may complete a one-week, off-site internship.

CERTIFICATION

LRATC will award certificates to students who successfully complete the requirements for this twelve-credit program. Hairstyling is a designated trade under Apprenticeship Manitoba, therefore in order to work in the industry students must meet Apprenticeship standards (see below).

APPRENTICESHIP AND EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES

The Hairstyling program at LRATC is accredited by Apprenticeship Manitoba under the trade of Hairstylist. To become an apprentice students must:

- Successfully complete the Hairstyling program at LRATC (1400 hours).
- Maintain an accumulative average of 70% or higher in the trade subjects.
- **Obtain a grade of** 70% or higher on each component of the practical exam administered by Apprenticeship Manitoba.
- Have a completed Grade 12 high school standing or equivalent.
- **Gain employment** under the supervision of a Journeyperson Hairstylist and register as an apprentice.

Near the completion of a two-year apprenticeship, a theory exam will be administered by Apprenticeship Manitoba.

INFORMATION SYSTEMS

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Students will learn the fundamental skills required to design, install, configure, manage, secure and troubleshoot computers, networks and their associated devices. This program uses Cisco authorized curriculum and students will be enrolled in the Cisco Networking Academy online. Credits obtained through the Cisco Networking Academy are internationally recognized and are readily transferable.

INTERNSHIP

A four-week internship is a component in PART 2 of the program.

CERTIFICATION

LRATC will award certificates to students who successfully complete the requirements for this eight-credit program.

OPTIONAL INDUSTRY CERTIFICATION

- CompTIA A + Computer Repair Technician certification is available to students upon completion of Part 1 of the program. A+ certification is an international industry credential that validates the knowledge of computer service technicians.
- CompTIA Net + Network Technician certification validates the knowledge of networking professionals and is available to students upon completion of Part 2.
- Cisco Certified Entry Network Technician (CCENT) industry exam is available to students upon completion of Part 2.

NEW MEDIA DESIGN

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Students will learn to develop and produce interactive digital media projects such as websites, games and apps. Students will gain knowledge and skills in digital design, asset creation, coding, and project management. Using a project-based approach, they will combine technology and artistic skills to create authentic interactive digital media applications.

PRACTICUM

Students will have the opportunity to work with real clients over a period of four months, where they will design and develop a website based on the client's requirements. Students will not be required to work off-site. Occasionally, students may be required to meet clients at their place of business.

CERTIFICATION

LRATC will award certificates to students who successfully complete the requirements for this eight-credit program.

ARTICULATION

Red River College Polytechnic will recognize LRATC's New Media Design program as the equivalent of their Digital Media Design year 1 program, when the student is pursuing the Interaction Design and Development diploma program stream. To be eligible for this a student must have successfully completed all 8 credits in the New Media Design program and be applying to RRC Polytech within 5 years of program completion.

PLUMBING TRADES

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Designed for students with an interest in the piping and plumbing industry.

This program prepares students for employment, apprenticeship, or for further education in the plumbing industry. Theory and demonstrations will focus on all aspects of residential piping and plumbing including sanitary drainage and water supply systems.

INTERNSHIP

A four-week work internship is a component in the second part of the program.

CERTIFICATION

LRATC will award certificates to students who successfully complete the requirements for this eight-credit program.

APPRENTICESHIP & EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES

The Plumbing Trades program at LRATC is an accredited program by Apprenticeship Manitoba under the trade of Plumber. To receive credit for Level 1 in-school Technical Training and a time credit of 900 hours students must:

- Successfully complete the Plumbing Trades program at LRATC.
- Maintain an accumulative average of 70% or better in trade subjects.
- Gain employment and register as an apprentice within two years of graduating.



Academic credits are scheduled into class periods where a certified teacher is available to offer one-on-one assistance. Academic classes need to be arranged with home school or LRATC student services teachers.





HIGH SCHOOL APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAM

DESCRIPTION

The LRSD High School Apprenticeship Program (HSAP) allows students to earn up to eight Grade 12 credits and up to 880 hours of on-the-job training towards continued apprenticeship training after graduation. It is available to all high school students, with age limitations in some trades.

Depending on school timetable, students may be able to do paid work during the day, evening, or weekend and still earn HSAP high school credits toward graduation. Summer work may also qualify. Students must work a minimum of 110 hours towards apprenticeship in any of more than 50 designated trades to receive one 40S level credit. Students must maintain a grade of 70% or higher on their workplace evaluations.

Combining LRATC and HSAP allows students registered at LRATC to enroll in HSAP for their paid trade-related evening, weekend, and summer work. Students can combine the hours earned through both programs for a significant start on apprenticeship, all the while earning high school credits from both LRATC and HSAP.

PREREQUISITES & BENEFICIAL SKILLS

Students must be at least 16 years of age and completing core subjects in Grades 10–12.

ADVANTAGES

- Explore careers in trades in a real setting
- Make your part-time job count
- Begin apprenticeship while in school
- Earn up to eight Grade 12 credits towards graduation
- Get paid to learn



WHAT ABOUT INSURANCE?

While working on the job, students are employees of the employer and the employer is required to provide insurance coverage. If the trade is deemed compulsory by Workers Compensation, students must receive Workers Compensation coverage from Workers Compensation Board of Manitoba. Where the employer is within a non-compulsory trade, then it is the employer's responsibility to provide insurance comparable to provincial Workers Compensation coverage. Students who are working for a parent or guardian may apply for an insurance waiver. If an accident occurs, the employer should inform the Louis Riel School Division HSAP teacher and follow standard accident procedures.
